






2024 Calls for Service



91,703 - Total Calls for Service (CFS)


- 2,424 more calls for service than calendar year 2023






2024 Robbery Incidents






2024: 3 Cases

- 31 of the 50 cases, the vehicles were left unlocked with the keys inside the vehicles (62%)
- 37 of the 50 cases, the vehicle was recovered (74%)

2024 Residential Burglaries





27 Residential Burglaries in 2024

- 12 of the 27 cases were cleared (44% clearance rate)
- 10 of the 12 cleared cases resulted in arrests
- 2 of the 27 cases the victim refused to prosecute
- 7 of the 27 cases had a garage that was unlocked or left opened

108 Vehicle Burglaries in 2024

- 32 cases Cleared by Arrest (30%)
- 86 of the 108 cases were Unsecured or Left Unlocked (80%).
- 7 of the 108 cases were Smashed Windows (6%)
- 8 of the 108 cases were Attempt Only (7%)
- 16 of the 108 cases involved suspects who lived in Wellington (15%)




139 Shoplifting cases in 2024 compared to 172 in 2023 (19% decrease in cases)

- 72 of the 139 shoplifting cases occurred at the Wellington Green Mall, accounting for 52% of the cases
- 59 of the 139 shoplifting cases were either cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared (42% of cases)

2024 Mail Theft Cases





2024 Golf Cart Incidents







Total Calls for Service (CFS) at Short Term Rentalsincreased 55% from 40 CFS in 2023 to 62 CFS in 2024

- Noise related incidents represented 45% of the total CFS
- Parking related issues represented 18% of the total CFS
- Greenview Shores and Sugar Pond Manor had the majority of the CFS with a combined 26 incidents, or 42% of the total CFS

2024 Traffic Crashes




Performance Goal:

2024 Performance Goals - Burglary and Theft

Performance Goals:

- Maintain Burglary and Theft crimes less than 800 cases in 2025.
- Clear at least 10% of burglaries by arrest.

Result (How did we do on our 2024 LESP Goals?):

- Residential Burglary increased 13% from 2023 (24) to 2024 (27).
- Burglary and Theft crimes decreased 26% from 2023 (561) to 2024 (417).
 - Surpassed the objective of "less than 800 cases" by 48% with only 417 combined Burglary and Theft cases for 2024.
- Of the 141 burglaries in 2024, 32% were cleared by arrest (45).
 - Surpassed the objective to "clear at least 10% of burglaries" by arrest.

2024 Juvenile Arrests and Monitoring (JAM) Unit

- The JAM unit monitors juveniles exclusively in the Village of Wellington, but will respond to another city or District if the juvenile has a nexus to Wellington Some responsibilities of the JAM unit include, but are not limited to:
- Monitor active court ordered probation sanctions
- Maintain cohesive relationships with DJJ, School Board, and the youth's family
- Early intervention and rehabilitation of the juvenile
- ¬ Curfew Checks
- Contact juveniles who are newly admitted to Home Detention/Probation within 48 hours
- Execute juvenile pick up orders

In 2024, the JAM Deputy assisted the District 8 Detective Bureau by handling property crimes in addition to his JAM workload. The JAM Deputy worked a combined 90 juvenile related and property crime cases, successfully clearing 32% of them.




Available online, Wellington residents can request to have extra patrol conducted at their residences if they will be away for an extended period of time or at their places of business during times of concern.







