





Percentage change 2019 vs 2021: 1.54% increase Percentage change 2020 vs 2021: 117.58% increase





5. Performance Goals - Burglary and Theft


- Performance Goals:
 - Maintain <u>Burglary</u> and <u>Theft</u> crimes less than 800 cases in 2022.
 - Clear at least 10% of burglaries by arrest.
- Result (How did we do on our 2021 LESP Goals?):
 - Residential Burglaries decreased 36% from 2020 (39) versus 2021 (25).
 - Burglary and <u>Theft</u> crimes increased 15.5% from 2020 (413) to 2021 (477).
 - If comparing <u>Burglary</u> and <u>Theft</u> crimes from 2019 (707) to 2021 (477), crimes actually <u>decreased 32.53%</u>.
 - Surpassed the objective "less than 800 cases" by 40.38%.
 - Of the 150 burglaries in 2021, 19.33% were cleared by arrest (29).
 - Surpassed the objective "clear at least 10%" by arrest.

During Equestrian Season, numbers go up slightly.

The Season runs from the end of November through the 2nd week of April.





8. Performance Goal - Traffic Issues

Performance Goal:

Maintain a Crash Rate (CR) of less than 3.0 crashes per 100
 Village Residents.

Result (How did we do?):

- Initial Traffic Stops increased 50% from 2020 (8,751) to 2021 (13,170).
- Crashes increased 17.56% from 2020 (1,042) versus 2021 (1,225).
- If comparing crashes from 2019 (1392) versus 2021 (1225), crashes actually decreased 12%.
- The CR per 100 residents increased 19.24% from a 2020 CR (1.663) to a 2021 CR (1.983).
- The CR per 100 residents for 2019 (2.232) versus 2021 (1.983) actually decreased 11.16%
- Even with the increase, we surpassed the objective to "maintain a CR of less than 3.0".

9. 2021 Law Enforcement Service Plan Objectives

2022 Action Plans

Burglary and Theft Crime Goals:

- •Maintain Burglary and Theft crimes less than 800 cases in 2022.
- •Clear at least 10% of burglaries by arrest.

Traffic Safety Goals:

•Maintain a crash rate of less then 3.0 crashes per 100 residents in 2022.

Burglary and Theft crimes are the combined total number of 2021 Burglary, Shoplifting and Theft/Larceny cases.

10. Action Plans, Operations, and Special Initiatives

Annual Holiday Action Plan:

•Implemented "Operation Mall Shield" for the 2021 holiday shopping season, which ran from December 1st-27th. The operation's objective was to deter and combat criminal activities, with a focus on preventing robberies, thefts, auto thefts, vehicle burglaries, smash and grabs, and retail thefts at the Mall at Wellington Green. The mall is Wellington's premier shopping venue and safety is of paramount importance to PBSO.







12. License Plate Reader Statistics

LPR System Success Stories:

21-085072- Units were alerted by an LPR hit of a Silver Ford which was a suspect vehicle used in a shooting involving multiple victims. Vehicle hit an LPR in Wellington and was followed to District 3 (West Palm Beach area) where it was stopped and the subject arrested without incident.

21-089791- Units were alerted by an LPR hit at Southern Boulevard and 20 Mile Bend of a blue Kia Optima, which was taken during an armed carjacking in Wellington. The vehicle was located in Pahokee, where the driver was arrested and charged.

21-091957 - A white Ford pickup truck was suspected of destroying a large section of grass near Greenbriar Blvd and Windsock Way in the Aero Club. The LPR system was instrumental in identifying the suspect, who was subsequently identified and provided a full confession.

21-104960 – Street Team agents were alerted by the LPR system of a blue Toyota possibly occupied by a wanted person from Broward County with several felony warrants. The vehicle was located in Wellington shortly after the alert and was stopped based on observed infractions. One of the occupants was found to be the person being sought and was placed under arrest without incident.

LPR System Success Stories (continued):

21-112045 – Units were alerted to a stolen silver Jeep that hit the LPR at Forest Hill Boulevard and Quercus. Units followed the vehicle to Forest Hill and Jog Road where the vehicle was stopped and three juvenile subjects were arrested. Two of the subjects were wanted by District 9 (Village of Royal Palm) for related charges. All three were charged with various crimes.

21-116960/21-116958 – District 9 (Village of Royal Palm) called out an LPR hit for a stolen vehicle that was eastbound from 20 Mile Bend. District 8 Street Team agents located the vehicle and maintained surveillance on it until it parked at an apartment complex in the city of Delray Beach where the vehicle was stopped. The front passenger was a felon in possession of an unholstered Glock 43 in the passenger door panel and was found to be on probation. The subject was taken into custody without incident.

21-138058 – Street Team agents developed information from a Wellington LPR hit for a silver Honda CRV where the registered owner of the vehicle had an active warrant with the U.S. Marshals. The investigation lead them to believe the suspect was visiting family in Wellington, but lived in the Delray Beach area. Team members tracked the suspect to the Delray Beach area and arrested him without incident.

12. License Plate Reader Statistics

LPR System Success Stories (continued):

21-138226 – District 9 (Village of Royal Palm) units were alerted by an LPR hit for a Toyota Camry that was stolen from the Palm Beach Gardens/NPB area. Units followed the vehicle to a gas station on Wellington Trace and Greenview Shores. The vehicle was stopped and the occupants were taken into custody with the assistance of Districts 8, 9, K9, and Aviation. A search of the vehicle resulted in a semi-automatic handgun being found inside the vehicle. Both subjects were arrested, one for the stolen vehicle, and the other for carrying a concealed firearm.

21-128889 – Units were alerted to an LPR hit at Lake Worth Road/Panther Run of a black Honda. The driver of this vehicle was a prolific shoplifter with two warrants and active PC out of District 1 (Unincorporated Lake Worth) for felony retail theft. District 1's Detective Bureau Sergeant located the vehicle and conducted a traffic stop on it resulting in the arrest of the suspect.
