More than 80,000 American service members remain MIA

Bernie O. Aaberg was an Army private with the 170th Engineer Combat Battalion from Minnesota who went missing in the Philippines during World War II. Frank W. Zywicki of New York also went missing in that war, a Naval quartermaster lost when his submarine, the USS Cisco, is believed to have been sunk by Japanese bombers in the South China Sea in late 1943.

Aaberg and Zywicki have the distinctions of being, alphabetically, the first and last service members on the U.S. military's list of those

missing in action. Between the two of them are more than 80,000 others.

Data from the Defense Department's POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) outlines the scale of the number of those still considered lost in action. The missing originated from each of the 50 states and any number of U.S. territories — including the Philippines, which was an American commonwealth at the time of the war. The three states with the most missing native sons and daughters are New York, California and Pennsylvania. (Were it a state, the Philippines would rank fourth on this list, with 4,533 service mem-

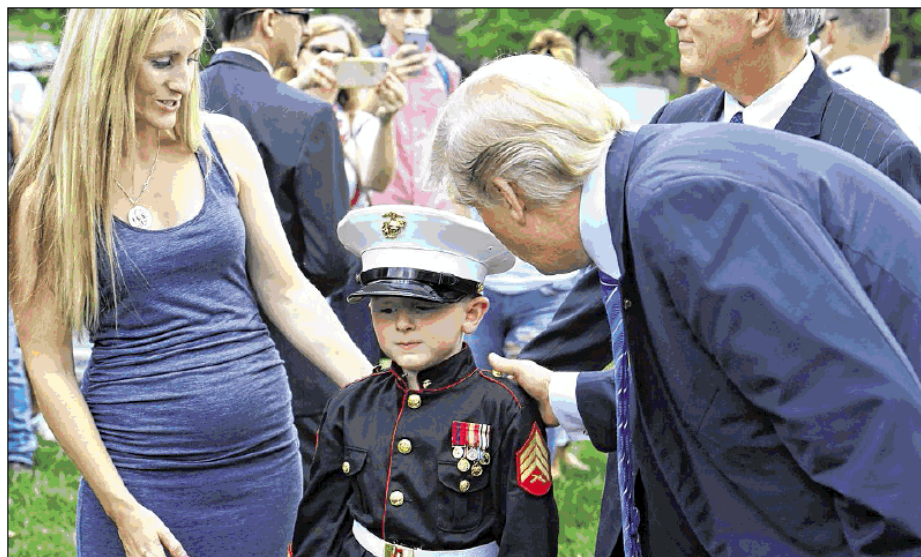
bers listed as missing.) Relative to population, West Virginia, the District of Columbia and Iowa are missing the most service members.

The geography of those losses maps to the most significant U.S. conflicts of the 20th century. More than 10,000 Americans are considered missing after service in the Philippines, with thousands more missing in the surrounding waters. About 5,800 are missing in the Solomon Islands. More than 5,000 are missing on the Korean Peninsula. Thousands are missing in the South Pacific, in the North Atlantic and across Western Europe.

The DPAA continually updates its data as it locates the remains of those missing in action. On May 19, the agency announced that it had accounted for the remains of Marine Corps Reserve Cpl. Henry Andregg Jr., who was killed on the first day of fighting at Tarawa atoll in November 1943. Andregg's remains had been interred in Honolulu and were identified this month using laboratory analysis.

More than 2,000 others have been similarly accounted for.

Many, particularly those lost at sea, probably never will be.

his associates, including his son-in-law, Jared Kushner, smiled and seemed to enjoy the enthusiastic welcome by a supportive crowd.

Sticking closely to his prepared text, Trump offered no insight into his thinking about how to proceed in the various wars that the United States is currently fighting, including the battle against the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria or the war in Afghanistan.

The Pentagon has proposed sending another 5,000 troops to Afghanistan to bolster the force that has been fighting there since shortly after the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

Some of Trump's political advisers, including Stephen Bannon, were about

have died in combat in recent years and also honored former Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., who was wounded in Italy during World War II and attended Monday's event.

"They were all angels sent to us by God, and they all share one title in common, and that is the title of hero, real heroes," he said. "Though they were here only a brief time before God called them home, their legacy will endure forever."

Like his three most recent predecessors, Trump never served in combat nor the active-duty military, and at one point during his campaign last year he offended veterans by denigrating the service of Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., a Navy pilot who spent 5½ years as a prisoner of war in North Vietnam. "He's not a war hero," Trump said at the time. "He was a war hero because he

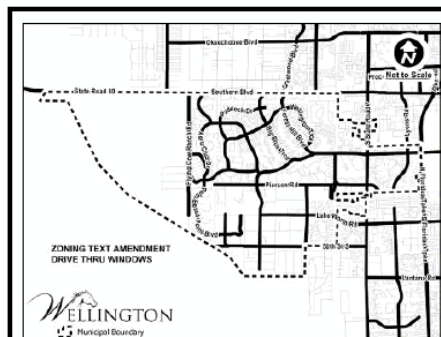
F. Kelly, a retired four-star general now serving as secretary of Homeland Security whose son, 2nd Lt. Robert M. Kelly of the Marines, was killed when he stepped on a land mine in 2010 in southern Afghanistan.

"We grieve with you, we honor you and we pledge to you that we will always remember Robert and what he did for all of us," the president said.

Trump also cited Spc. Christopher Horton, a member of the Oklahoma National Guard, who died in a gunbattle with insurgents in Afghanistan in 2011, and Maj. Andrew Byers, a member of the Green Berets who was killed during an attack on a Taliban bastion last year. "Chris sacrificed his life to protect his fellow soldiers and to protect all Americans," Trump said. Addressing Horton's grieving widow

your son and his courageous sacrifice."

After his speech, Trump also stopped by the cemetery's Section 60 to lay flowers at Kelly's gravestone. Section 60 contains the remains of many other service members who have died in the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq.
